Dalhart supports new Community Education/Enrichment Program

While work, work, work, busy, busy, busy, seems to be the resounding mantra as Dalhart turns in the wheel of change, growth and progress, five public entities have joined forces to make sure that their constituents keep sight of the fun, fun, fun, joy, joy, joy of leisure learning by funding the creation of a Dalhart Community Education Program. Supported by the Dalhart Independent School District, City of Dalhart, Dallam-Hartley Counties Hospital District and both Dallam and Hartley Counties, the community based education/enrichment program should have the first class and workshop offerings by the beginning of November, said Superintendent David Foote, who championed the program to the five entities along with Carolyn Field, XIT School principal, and Sylvia Renick, program coordinator.

vide a vehicle for individuals to interact in a positive and productive learning environment. This is exciting; it's a win - win proposition for the citizens of Dalhart, the local businesses and the schools," said Mrs. Field.

The idea behind community education classes is not a new concept. As Sylvia Renick, coordinator wrote in a proposal to the public entities, "the need for a program promoting lifelong learning was apparent as early as 1911 when Wisconsin passed the "lighted schoolhouse" legislation in support of night time use of schools to teach English to immigrants. Today Community Education programs of varying magnitude exist in most states, each program individually crafted to enhance the quality of life of the people it serves whether it be by teaching English to immigrants, supplementing school Arts education, teaching job skills to teens, or offering enrichment classes for everyone. The benefits of a Community Education program are greater quality of life and increased community desirability while using existing facilities, mainly schools and existing resources, teachers and community professionals."

"One of the first steps in establishing a curriculum would be to conduct a community wide survey to assess the interests and needs of residents and businesses. Basically classes would fall into two categories, educational and enrichment, geared toward children, students, adults and seniors. In addition to longer classes there could be week-end workshops, cultural excursions, mentoring programs, etc." Surveys will be distributed in Dalhart through schools, the Dalhart Chamber of Commerce, United Supermarket and published in the Dalhart Daily Texan. Surveys will be distributed in similar locations in Channing, Hartley and Texline.

Some of the sample enrichment classes mentioned in the proposal, were home related such as gardening, xeriscaping, cooking for children, holiday decorating, and learning to sell on EBay. Sports related classes included golf etiquette for beginning golfers, fly fishing, narrated nature hikes along Rita Blanca Lake, hunter safety, and boating safety. Life skills classes listed were: job skill basics for teens, budgeting skills for teens or adults, simple saving techniques, caring for elderly parents, dealing with grief, or handling relocation. For seniors the proposal mentioned classes such

as memory training, reflex training, or afternoon dancing.

Examples of educational classes included be adult literacy, children's literacy, learning English, learning Spanish, computer basics, internet safety, just to mention a few.

The list could be endless, explained Renick, and is only limited by the ability to match teachers with class requests.

Program Setup

Each of the five entities contributed \$5,000.00 to help establish the Community Education Program, with the City of Dalhart adding \$2,000.00 to help cover unexpected costs. The Dalhart School District will also provide in-kind donations with office space and administrative support, free use of facilities for classes, as well as act as fiduciary agent. Of the funds raised \$15,000 will be used to pay the coordinator's salary the remainder will be used for publicity, supplies, etc. In most cases teacher salaries will be paid from class tuition. A board of directors, composed of appointees from each funding entity, will be established to help oversee and guide the program.

The long term plan for the program, as stated in this proposal, is a three step approach, the first being the creation of a healthy enrichment program, followed by programs designed to fulfill continuing education credits and finally incorporating vocational and college credit classes.

From the Desk of a Pretty Good Typist

Recently someone asked, “When did I become interested in community education?” I had to really think, the answer was so many years ago.

In 1965 my husband was returning to the University of Wyoming as a freshman, no matter that he was 27 years old and we had 3 children under the age of 5, we forged ahead. As a way to help fund this adventure I decided that I would need to seek employment. But what could I do? Not a lot.

The local high school was offering beginning typing as a community education course, so full of expectations I enrolled. The first night I noticed that the typewriter keys were blank, no letters at all. On the wall at the front of the class was a large diagram of a keyboard with letters that the students were to refer to. The instructor said, “Let’s begin, put a piece of paper in the typewriter”, but where? Never assume that people have seen a typewriter before (lesson number one). After what seemed like an eternity, the instructor gently took my piece of paper and it disappeared into the machine. I look at my grandchildren today and they have been typing since they were pre-school. But I bet they wouldn’t know how to put paper into a manual typewriter. But still I persevered and passed the course, signed up for additional classes and became a proficient typist. However, I still look at the wall in front of me when I type.

My very first community education course enabled me to find a job at the University, and located on the same floor was the community education office. One day the coordinator asked me what could I teach (sound familiar?).

I couldn’t think of a thing. Not giving up, he asked about my background, hob-



bies etc. I told him my father had been an exhibition ballroom dancer and he had taught me to dance, plus my grandmother taught me to knit. Thus, began my career in community education. I taught ballroom dance and knitting for the next 35 years. The little extra money was great, but that was not my reason for teaching. It was the people, so eager to learn, so wonderful to interact with and share their lives. To see their faces light up when they completed a row of knitting or mastered a new dance step was reward enough.

As I learned more about community education throughout the next few years I realized that I had found my calling. Teaching people to learn for a lifetime had to be the most important thing I could do. I had the opportunity to join the community education staff at Eastern Wyoming College where I learned how to coordinate classes, instructors, locations and students. The hardest thing for me to learn was writing a course description that would encourage students to enroll. For many years I found myself writing course description in my head as I stood in the grocery line, looking at ads in a magazine, salespeople in the mall. Finally I had it mastered.

Those involved in community education are the most generous, sharing people that you will ever meet. Everything that I have learned or accomplished in my career came with the help of my community education family. That is why as TCEA members we stand ready to help each other. If you need help or have a question contact me or your regional director. Maybe a TAP grant would help solve a problem. Remember TAP is not just money, but a team of professionals will be assigned to you, with the expertise in areas that you need help.

As the Executive Secretary of TCEA I am here to help and I would love to hear from you. Just remember that as I am typing this I am looking at the wall in front of me and “praise be”, there is no place you have to insert paper.
