TCEA's "Northern Exposure"

North Texas community education departments are getting a boost from TCEA in January when the association brings its popular After School Providers workshop to North Texas.

Board members Vicki Helms (Mesquite ISD) and Lee Ann Bandy (Lewisville ISD) and other committee members have begun planning the January conference that will offer special training sessions targeted at those who work with children outside of regular school hours. Participants will earn in-service hours by attending breakout sessions that will cover the latest trends in child development practices.

A job fair also is planned for the day-long conference where participants will have networking opportunities with area care providers, school programs and franchise representatives.

Lewisville ISD is hosting the TCEA After School Providers workshop at the district's ninth grade campus, Killough LHS-N, on January 23. The cost to attend is \$20 for TCEA members and school employees and \$25 for non-TCEA members.

On Oct. 23 we had a networking lunch at Golden Corral in Lewisville. It was an opportunity for regional community education leaders to share their programs' successes and challenges over all you can eat fried stuff.

At afterschool workshop in San Antonio

About 300 frontline after-school providers took advantage of the convenient and affordable training offered by the Texas Community Education Association on October 10 at the North East ISD Community Education center in San Antonio.

Helen Kimsey, Exec. Secy. of TCEA and Becky Stoughton, Director of Adult & Community Education for North East ISD headed up the group that planned the training, along with members of TCEA, NEISD staff, and San Antonio-based trainers.

Attendees rotated through 36 breakouts during the daylong workshop. Topics ranged from bullying and making crafts to dealing with difficult children and parents. Lunch was included.

Gregg Catalano "The Physician of Phun" delivered the keynote address. He shared proven techniques for dealing with daily stress.

"We were very pleased with the enthusiastic response," Kimsey said. "I heard comments from frontline staff such as 'this made me feel like a professional' and 'when is the next one?'"

Kimsey noted they were pleased to see participants come from the surrounding areas, including Dripping Springs and Fredericksburg.

"It was great value for the money," Kimsey said. "Sharing information is part of the mission of TCEA."

Of course fieldtrips are always one of the highlights of the summer and we had some great ones. We kicked off the summer by visiting Mr. Gatti's for pizza and games. Some of the other fieldtrips were Malibu Castle, MacArthur Park, and Live Oak Movie Theater. We were able to get a rare fieldtrip to TxDOT Trans Guide, where the children were able to tour the Trans Guide control center. Another very exciting trip we were able to attend was a San Antonio Stars basketball game, the children loved this trip and the Silver Stars won their game, which made it even more fun. We capped off the summer with a fun filled day at Splashtown.

We were very fortunate to have wonderful visitors. We had visitors from our community agencies such as Graffiti Awareness Program, Animal Care Services, San Antonio Fire Department,

Edwards Aquifer, Randolph Brooks Federal Credit Union, and Hill Country Karate. Texas A&M Extension Program gave a presentation at each of our sites about our city creatures. They left a City Creatures module at each site for a week so that the children could do some interacting on their own. On Mondays, the children were treated to "Story Time" presented by a special reader from the San Antonio Library. VIA bus has a special outreach program they bring to each site. Their program includes a video, a bus ride around town and some special take home treats. Each site also had a Bike Rodeo. The children loved this and they all went home with new bike helmets.

We also had some very special animal friends come visit us this summer. Sea World brought 2 penguins, an alligator, a snake and an owl. Their educational presentation was a big hit with our children and staff. We appreciate all our visitors for coming out to our sites and enhancing the students' education.

Meeting Summary

President Debby Theis called the meeting to order at 9:30 a.m. on 10/9/09. Present: Debby Theis, Becky Stoughton, Donna Davenport, Ester Buendia, Vicki Helms, Diana Hanz, and Lee Ann Bandy.

Minutes – We reviewed the Minutes from the June board meeting and made three corrections. Minutes were approved as corrected. An amended copy will be sent to board members.

Treasurer's Report – Helen Kimsey will report later in the meeting.

Status of Board Positions – New Assignments – Due to Sally Andrews' resignation as Secretary/Treasurer, Debby Theis appointed Vicki Helms as Secretary and Helen Kimsey as Treasurer. Helen will continue in the position of Executive Secretary for the organization. Debby also appointed Lee Ann Bandy as the Region 1 Director. This left the position of Director-at-Large open. This position as well as VP for Advisory Councils will remain vacant until elections in the spring. A motion was made by Becky Stoughton and seconded by Donna Davenport to accept these motions.

Regional Reports

Region 1 – Lee Ann Bandy – Lee Ann reported that she and a committee were planning an after-school providers' training for January 23, 2010 in Lewisville. She had secured a location, Killough LHSN, for the all-day event. She will also provide a meeting location for the TCEA board meeting on Friday, January 22. She will check on a nearby hotel and getting a state rate for board members. Lee Ann had several board members volunteer to do presentations – Becky Stoughton, Ester Buendia, Diana Hanz, Helen Kimsey. She will contact other possible presenters such as Kay Peters from Denton, etc. She would like to have at least 10 presenters.

Region 2 – Diana Hanz – Diana reported that she had 7-9 vendors coming to the After-school Training Workshop on Saturday, October 10. The table fee was \$25 each. She also secured the caterer for

the workshop. Approximately 300 participants are expected.

Diana also was completing a job description for the Awards chairperson. There will be some clarifications on the Awards ratings.

Region 3 – Ester Buendia – Ester assisted with the planning of the After-school Training Workshop and will assist with the workshop, also.

Region 4 – Carol Reeh – Not present. She will be at the Workshop on Saturday.

Committee Reports

TAP - Becky Stoughton – No new information as of this time.

Awards – Ester Buendia will be sending out Awards packets at the end of January or first of February. Several people had asked if nominations could be emailed or faxed. Originals MUST be mailed by the deadline date.

Elections – Vicki Helms Will keep a notebook of the Elections process timeline. Packets will be mailed out on or about January 20, 2010. Positions up for election are: President-elect; Director-Region 2; Director-Region 4; Director-at-Large; VP-Advisory Councils. Diana Hanz said she would be able to run for Region 2 director, but Carol Reeh will not be able to run for Region 4 this time.

Public Information – Helen Kimsey – It was discussed that TCEA needed some sort of report or description as to the web master's duties. Phil Houseal is our web master. Helen will speak with Phil about doing a description. This will benefit board members, old and new.

National Liaison – Debby Theis said she would be going to the NCEA conference this year. We voted to pay Debby's expenses. A motion was made and seconded.

Membership – Helen Kimsey – Helen reported that we had very few memberships received so far this year. She met with Phil regarding MemberClicks, which costs \$60 per month. They agreed Phil would do research to see if there was some other program better and less expensive out there. Phil found a program called Google Documents. He is exploring our options. Helen will do a reminder to mem-

bers and others about joining or renewing their TCEA dues.

Legislative – Becky Stoughton – The state of Texas is, like most other states, in financial trouble. Actually, the state is in dire straights. Budgets are being cut everywhere. Twenty-first Century grants appear to be ok for now. Stimulus monies are being used to help with salaries, schools, etc. We discussed using advisory boards to champion for CE.

Advisory Councils – Someone is going to check with Karon Lowe and Vicki will check with one of her advisory council members, Donna Adams, to see if they might be interested in running for VP in the spring.

Audit Committee – Debby, Lee Ann, Carol (who is absent today), and Becky will meet today.

Executive Secretary – Helen Kimsey – Reported above that she met with Phil about membership issues and web issues.

Treasurer's Report – Helen Kimsey – Since Helen was just appointed to this position, she is working with Sally Andrews to get all the signature details completed and start receiving the monthly financial statements. She reported: Checking account balance - \$2,544.99; CD - \$9,603.23; and Money Market - \$6,512.88. Total assets as of October 1 - \$18,512.88. A motion was made and seconded to accept the report.

Conference 2010 – Donna Davenport – Donna advised us that she had come up with the theme "Hawaiian Luau" for this year's conference. She had some large postcards printed to distribute at the after-school providers' training tomorrow, Oct. 10. These were "save the date" postcards. The conference will be Wednesday-Friday, April 7-9, 2010, at "Becky's Place" in San Antonio. We will also have a pre-conference on Tuesday, April 6. We discussed possible speakers. Donna will be checking on these.

Adjourn – A motion was made and seconded to adjourn the meeting at 3:15 p.m.

Hints From Helen "Ms Know-It-All"

The Human Side

Human communication and interactive skills have evolved from grunts, snorts and hand gestures over thousands of years. We human beings are very sociable animals and face to face meetings are an integral part of our lives.

However, times have changed and as a society are we returning to a non verbal world? Texting, twittering and emails, etc. have become the norm, people do not actually speak to one another. While technology is wonderful and we must move with the times, are we losing an important aspect of life? History has proved that when you take away the social part of daily life, communities crumble. Take the story of a village in India that depended on the daily use of a communal well. A well intentioned charity invested in pipe lines to carry the water to the villager's homes. Imagine their surprise when they returned one year later to find the pipes rusted and unused. One thing had been forgotten in the plan, the need to interact with others. To see familiar faces, hear their voices, to express happiness, joy or even anger, to be a part of a community.

Many people today use programs such as face book or my space to contact old friends or make new ones, without ever leaving their homes. The need for community is still there but just in a different format. One need never leave home to order groceries, buy clothes, books, furniture or even have food delivered. On line banking

appears to think for you as it pays your bills on time. If you feel ill you can search the internet to find your symptoms in order to diagnose yourself. All this without human contact or conversation.

Imagine a world where no-one heard the spoken words of Shakespeare or discussed the works of Elizabeth Barrett Browning. Do hand written love letters exist in this modern world? If the Scopes trials had been conducted by e-mail would it have had the same effect? I think not. The Kennedy/Nixon debates would not have been given a place in history had they been texted.

As a child growing up in England I remember housewives shopping every day, going to the butcher; baker; green grocer; etc. A trip that could have been over very quickly, sometimes would take several hours as they greeted everyone that passed. News was shared, problems solved and families discussed. Now with the advent of superstores, technology and cars no-one takes the time to be a part of that community. It is my belief that many of today's societal problems arrived with technology. Perhaps burglary, assaults and vandalism would not be committed against people that you knew, saw every day and were a part of your community.

How many times have you been talking

As my granddaughter's birthday approached she was not able to hand out her invitations to her soccer friends. She decided that she would text them, only to have her mother say; "Why not e-mail them and you could give all of the details?" To which my granddaughter replied in disgust, "But Mom... e-mailing is so slow". Did I get left behind or what? *Helen*

to someone only to have their thumbs clicking away at an unbelievable speed and have them never even look at you? Do you feel important? Or yet have another conversation interrupted by a buzzing sound that resonates from an object hanging from the other person's ear. Again, you feel dismissed. I have been left alone in meeting rooms as one by one people leave to take their phone calls. Surely that does not help anyone's self image.

I was in a store recently when a gentleman who was looking directly at me, said he couldn't find the bottled water. As I was explaining the directions and waving my arms to help, he walked right past me. Confused, I realized that he was talking on the phone and not to me.

How to address the problem? Manners, courtesy and respect for others would help, but mainly we must be careful not to lose the "Human Side" of our communities. Enjoy the surprise on people faces as you say "good morning" to each person you pass, Have a conversation while waiting in line, many people live alone and you may be their only contact that day. Have conversations that are longer than sound bites, listen and interact with children, they have many important things to say. My point is that we need our "communities" and what better place to begin than in a community education program. I could extol the virtues of community education but I would be preaching to the choir. We already know the value of gathering with other people to learn for a lifetime. We just have to make sure that all of our communities have that same opportunity.

Let us be leaders in a verbal world, converse with new people each day and equally important listen.

One note, in case you are thinking that I am against new technology, let me assure you that I would text., twitter, tweet, if only I knew how.

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
